For sexual health: I can prescribe hormonal birth control methods, I offer the morning after pill for free, I do pregnancy tests for free, I do confidential STI testing and I can prescribe treatments for STI's and vaginal infections, and much more. I can refer students to medical or psychosocial resources as needed at the CLSC St-Laurent or in the community. Security agents are always the first response in case of an emergency and my role is to offer them support in exceptional situations.

I am a dynamic and caring person and I am honored to be part of the Vanier College community.

#### October is Cyber Security Month! Let's do our part in keeping safe



The Government of Quebec is urging all of us to take Cybersecurity seriously. Let's be the first line of defense.

#### Do you know the meaning of multi-factor authentication?

Authentication is the means by which the identity of the person using a service is verified.

To authenticate a user, there are three main strategies that can be used.



The first strategy is what we know. This one relies on the fact that an individual is able to keep a secret.

The best-known factor in this category is a password. A password can be discovered if it is too simple. It can also be stolen by malware or a hacker during an intrusion or hacking.



**Another strategy is what you own.** This one is based on the fact that an individual has something unique that can be identified. In this category is a physical token or a mobile app with regularly changing numbers on it. Another example is an employee access card. Here, one issue is the potential loss of the device.



The final strategy is what you are. This strategy is based on an individual's identifying features that cannot be easily replicated. Fingerprints, voice, iris, face are some examples. These factors come from the field of biometrics. This is an option that is not always available because of the specialized equipment it requires.



In closing, it should be noted that the **use of multi-factor authentication is to be preferred** when it is available. It must use at least **two different strategies** to reduce the risk of bypassing the authentication process.





#### **Training Workshops for Staff**

Tuesday, November 15th, 1 – 4 pm OR Wednesday, November 16, 2 – 5 pm: Circle to Box Exercise with Facilitator Diane Labelle The Circle to Box exercise is a psychodrama activity designed by Jann Derrick PhD R.M.F.T. It is a tool used worldwide to assist participants in the integration of Indigenous history and trauma through an experiential and Indigenous way of Teaching and Learning. As the story is told, the participants experience the Indigenous social structures/feelings in place before colonization and how this has changed due to a series of laws and actions imposed upon them. Because all aspects of the self are engaged – mental, emotional, physical and spiritual, this is an effective way to bring individuals to understanding how and why Indigenous lives have been impacted through colonization. This event will take place during Alyson Jones' Humanities classes, but all are welcome to join. Please register here.

to Settler Talks This series of events provides casual opportunities for mutual education on Indigenous topics between non-Indigenous staff. Each session will begin with a short presentation on a given theme. Then, an open discussion will be held based on the interests and needs of whoever is in attendance. This is a chance for you to ask "uncomfortable" questions that you may not want to ask one of our Indigenous facilitators. This will be a judgement-free zone, where you can work through complicated thoughts or feelings about your role in Indigenous education if you are non-Indigenous.

These talks are open to everyone in the Vanier community (staff, students, etc.). Although classroom contexts might come up often, given the nature of our institution, these topics can all be adapted to people's respective work.

Counselling can help students better cope with stress and depression, as well as acquire more effective problem-solving, decision-making, communication and interpersonal skills. The Mental Health & Wellness Center's professionals have the training and expertise required to work effectively with students experiencing these obstacles.

#### Health Services



The Health Service Office is here to help students develop and maintain their potential for good health. Services available include: general health assessments and consultations, smoking cessation support, STI and pregnancy testing, emergency contraception and birth control. All individual consultations are strictly confidential. Health Services are offered in collaboration with CIUSSS du Nord-de-l'Île-de-Montréal.

#### Student Advocacy



The Student Advocate informs students of their rights and responsibilities and guides them in dealing with conflict and other concerns. They may support the student through resolution processes that include, but are not limited to, mediation, Grades Review, Cheating & Plagiarism Review and other appeals.

#### Code of Conduct



The Office of the Code of Conduct sets forth the norms and behaviours expected from all members of the Vanier College community, to ensure a safe environment that promotes learning activities. Social Services Officers are responsible for student conduct accountability, and for contributing efforts to maintain a safe and positive campus.

#### Career Counselling



Sometimes students feel confused about their choice of program or need support figuring out what they will do once they graduate from college. By supporting them make career choices that are right for them, a Guidance Counsellor can help motivate students about their future. Career counselling can help students learn about themselves and explore occupations that are in line with their interests, personal traits and unique values. They can also explore the job market and determine the steps needed to attain their career goals.

#### Sexual Violence Prevention and Response



Vanier College has a specialized support resource available to any student who has been impacted by sexual/dating violence that has occurred on or off campus. #### Access for Students with Disabilities, B-207



Vanier provides distinct support services for students with physical, medical, mental health and learning/neurological disabilities. Accommodations are determined on a case-by-case basis. Possible accommodations include: extra time for examinations, adaptive equipment, adaptive software, note-takers, interpreters, physical aides and elevator passes. In order to obtain accommodations, medical documentation detailing your disability and completed by a qualified professional is required.

#### Financial Aid



Trying to make ends meet while you are a student can be a challenge. The Financial Aid Office is where you can find information on Government Loans and Bursaries and other support systems set up to help you pay for your education. The Financial Aid Officer has information about other financial support programs at Vanier College including book loans, food support, emergency funds and scholarships.





Sunny Man Chu Lau, Full Professor in the School of Education at Bishop's University

Plurilingual and pluricultural perspectives of language teaching and learning in English and French CEGEPs

Plurilingualism espouses a dynamic view of language; instead of viewing languages as isolated and bounded systems, a plurilingual perspective highlights the mutual influences among languages and that bi/plurilingual individuals actively select, adapt, and utilize multiple language and cultural resources for myriad communicative purposes and intercultural interactions. Using daily life examples and research evidence, two important concepts central to plurilingualism will be examined: 1. Language and other meaning-making resources (cognitive, gestural, audiovi-

sual, etc.) are interconnected and interdependent; and 2. Language is inseparable from identity and culture. Based on these principles, important implications for language learning will be explored, illustrated by recent research projects on language connections.

## English Studies in the 21st Century: Past, Present, Future November 2-4, 2022

#### English Studies in the 21st century: Back to the Future (Past, Present and Future)

English Studies is a complex, diverse, and evolving discipline, Scholars in English Studies, Writing Studies, Applied Linguistics, and Language Policy and Planning are called to reexamine from where we have come, to understand where we are now and to prepare for where we are going—to reconsider the literary, linguistic, and writing skills that speakers and writers of English will need in an increasingly multilingual and multicultural world. Based on research showing that languages are interdependent and inseparable from identity and culture (e.g., Galante et al., 2022; Lau et al., 2020), this year's symposium will explore English Studies in three stages: (1) past, (2) present and (3) future: (1) the historical trajectory of the English language emerging as a lingua franca, the contrast between official and non-official languages, and Indigenous languages (e.g., legacy of residential schools); (2) current literary theories and new literacies that are re-shaping English Studies as well as language policy, for example, legislated monolingualism versus societal multilingualism, and reviving Indigenous languages; (3) future issues regarding English literature and language. including literary theories, new literacies, plurilingualism, Indigenous pedagogies, and anti-racist black pedagogies. Understanding the socio-historical context from which our discipline has emerged, informs our present, and transforms our future in both local and global contexts.

When you travel, you learn that to engage with a cuisine—to cook, share, and savour other people's foods—is the fastest way to appreciate and understand an unfamiliar culture. But in culinary terms, the past has long been a foreign country. Taras Grescoe has travelled the world to research his next book, The Lost Supper: Why the Future of Food Lies in the Past, looking for lost, ancient, and endangered foods. He'll share the story of one of his adventures, when National Geographic sent him to the

foothills of an active volcano in the heart of Turkey to seek out the legendary Silphion, a medecine and secret ingredient in ancient Greek and Roman cuisine, which was thought to have gone extinct 1,500 years ago.

#### Student Panel on Multilingualism (Moderated by Alan Wong, English Department)

As anyone who lives in Quebec knows, the politics of language is a messy, constant presence in our everyday lives. Indeed, the social and cultural tensions that arise from debates over language rights and laws feel almost inescapable. with many politicians, activists, and media outlets exacerbating the situation by keeping these issues circulating in the public sphere. Yet it seems that young people are often rendered invisible when it comes to having their opinions and experiences heard regarding the impact of such disputes on them. Given that it is their future in Quebec (and beyond) at stake, especially with the passing of Bill 96 into Law 14 and the recent provincial election results, it is more necessary than ever to engage with their voices on the matter. To this end, we have assembled a panel of multilingual Vanier students from a variety of backgrounds to share and discuss their perspectives on being students in Quebec who speak two or more languages and how they have been affected by the roller coaster ride of linguistic pressures they grapple with on a daily basis.

Challenging World Literature

In the last quarter century, World Literature re-emerged as a major academic discipline, as scholars rushed to diversify the field of literary studies. The goal of this renewed discourse was admirable in terms of widening the scope of literary analysis and comparative topics to include the post-Soviet and post-colonial world. However, the discipline still relied on particular national discourses, admitting only works that had achieved a certain success in a recognized nation, and this belied a Euro-centric understanding of the nation state and a traditional understanding of Romantic nationalism. This talk will address some of the new avenues of scholarship on World Literature that are attempting to grapple with a non-national basis for World Literature, one that de-centers Europe, focusing on the post-colonial and post-Soviet World, even while admitting to Europe's historic and economic influence on World Literature.

#### First Peoples' Postsecondary Storytelling Exchange

Dr. Phillips will present the First Peoples Postsecondary Storytelling Exchange project and its purpose: to share stories from Indigenous students with the goal of improving the post-secondary experience for future generations. The First People's Post-secondary storytelling exchange (2016-2021) is a project about creating more responsive post-secondary education for Indigenous students and honouring Indigenous approaches to teaching and learning. Over 100 people from First Nations, Inuit, and Métis communities shared personal stories of their educational journeys. Storytelling, talking circles, and filmmaking took place in the Tiohtià;ke (Montreal) area, Kanien'kehá:ka communities and in Inuit territory in Northern Quebec. Every immigrant demographic has heard these descriptors at some point in their migration history. We, the Others: Allophones, Immigrants and Belonging in Canada takes a contemporary look at the xenophobia, ethno-nationalism, and fear of the other that leads to discrimination and the belief that immigration is a polluting force. Rooted in the author's personal family history as the second-generation daughter of Greek immigrants, and from her research as a journalist and columnists covering identity politics and social issues in Quebec and Canada for the past 20 years, Toula Drimonis courageously tackles this country's history and practices, divisive legislation like Bill 21, and various nationalist movements that have influenced policy. We, the Others: Allophones, Immigrants and Belonging in Canada is a poignant look at inter-generational struggles, conflicting loyalties, and the heartfelt questions of belonging. The author will read from the chapter, "English, Frenglish, Greeklish." It discusses how minority groups take on the majority language by creating new, hybrid languages of their own. She will then take questions from the audience.



#### **External Grants: Application & Administration Procedures**

#### Want to apply for an external grant?

If you are interested in applying for an external grant, please contact the Research Officer, **Angela Vavassis**, as soon as possible (<u>researchofficer@vaniercollege.qc.ca</u>).

With respect to **developing your grant proposal**, the Research Officer can assist you in:

- Identifying the appropriate funding opportunity, and/or leveraging different funding opportunities for your project(s).
- Evaluating the fit of your project with a funding opportunity that you have identified on your own.
- Acquiring release time costs for teaching and non-teaching personnel from the Finance Department, if applicable.
- Providing information regarding in-kind support that can be provided by the college, if applicable.
- Ensuring that your proposal is in line with the guidelines, regulations and scholarly/scientific standards set by the funding agency and by the college.
- Obtaining all required internal approvals and signatures, in time for the funding agency's deadline.

Should you be awarded an external grant, the Research Officer will guide you with respect to **grant administration.** This includes helping with:

- Opening a grant account with the Finance Department.
- The process of submitting an Application to Conduct Research at Vanier (if applicable Research Projects only), and evaluating your application for institutional feasibility prior to forwarding to the Research Ethics Board (REB).
- The process of preparing and submitting progress, final and financial reports to the funding agencies, and obtaining all required internal signatures for those reports.

#### What is an Internal Deadline?

The Internal Deadline for each funding opportunity is the date by which the Research Office must receive a **complete application package** (first draft), by email: <a href="mailto:researchofficer@vaniercollege.qc.ca">researchofficer@vaniercollege.qc.ca</a>).

Once the application package has been received, the Research Officer will perform a **preliminary review**. If any edits need to be made to the application, the Research Officer will communicate those to the project leader, and will specify a date by which the application must be re-submitted (final version).

All applications must be submitted in **French**, when indicated. Any applications in need of translation to French must be submitted to the Research Office **at least a week in advance of the internal deadline**.

Please note that the Research Office is unable to guarantee that an application will be processed and submitted to a funding agency on time, if received past the internal deadline.

#### **Applications to Conduct Research at Vanier**

#### Who needs to apply?

Any research project involving human participants must undergo Research Ethics Board (REB) review, if it falls into at least one of the following categories:

- Research that recruits members of the Vanier community as participants.
- Research on human participants conducted by researchers based at Vanier.
- Research that uses data that is accessible within the college but not normally available to the public.

If in doubt, please reach out to <u>researchofficer@vaniercollege.qc.ca</u> and your question will be forwarded to the REB Chair for assessment.

#### How to apply

The Application to Conduct Research at Vanier (Word form) can be downloaded from our <u>website</u> and, once completed by the project leader, should be sent to <u>researchofficer@vaniercollege.qc.ca</u>, along with all required supporting documents.

#### When to apply

#### As soon as possible!

Please take note of the Fall 2022 application deadlines:

- In order to have your application reviewed by the REB at their October 27, 2022 meeting\*, please submit it by **October 13, 2022**\*\*.
- In order to have your application reviewed by the REB at their November 24, 2022 meeting\*, please submit it by **November 10, 2022**\*\*.

The Winter 2022 application deadlines will be announced at a later date.

<sup>\*</sup> When deciding when to submit your application, please keep in mind that the REB may request modifications to it following the meeting in which they will review it. You may only begin your data collection once your application is approved by the REB and an ethics certificate is issued for your project.

<sup>\*\*</sup> If you require assistance to complete your application, please reach out at least 1 week earlier than the application deadline.

#### How are applications evaluated?

All applications to conduct research at Vanier will be evaluated using a 2-step process:

#### Step 1: Evaluation by the Research Officer, for institutional feasibility

Decisions and/or required changes with respect to institutional feasibility will be communicated to the applicant by the Research Officer. Once the application is deemed institutionally feasible, the Research Officer will forward it to the Research Ethics Board (REB).

#### Step 2: Evaluation by the Research Ethics Board (REB), for research ethics

Recommendations with regards to the ethical conduct of research and issuance of the Ethics Certificate are provided independently by the Research Ethics Board. Without an Ethics Certificate, you may not begin your data collection.

#### TCPS 2: CORE-2022 Tutorial (https://tcps2core.ca/)

Within Vanier's Strategic Plan 2021-2026, an emphasis is placed on creativity and innovation, both within academic areas and without. In many cases, such innovation results from research projects involving human participants, which are conducted by our faculty and staff.

The college is also committed to upholding the highest standards of practice and integrity in its operations.

As such, we highly encourage members of the Vanier community who are currently conducting or who plan to conduct research with humans to complete the **TCPS 2: CORE-2022 Tutorial**, at their earliest convenience. This tutorial introduces the Tri-Council Policy Statement: Ethical Conduct for Research Involving Humans (TCPS 2). Upon completion of the tutorial, you will receive a Certificate.

Many institutions that have research divisions have already made the completion of this training a standard of practice for their researchers, research ethics boards and research administrators. Following their lead will help us ensure that all research with humans overseen by the college is conducted in an ethically sound manner.

Please note that this training is not a requirement yet. However, **beginning in Fall 2022, all researchers who wish to conduct research involving humans at Vanier College will be required to complete the TCPS 2: CORE-2022 Tutorial**. The certificate they obtain must be included as an attachment with every Application to Conduct Research (involving humans) at Vanier.

#### **Connection Grants**

These grants support events and outreach activities geared toward short-term, targeted knowledge mobilization initiatives. These events and activities represent opportunities to exchange knowledge and to engage with participants on research issues of value to them. Events and outreach activities funded by a Connection Grant can often serve as a first step toward more comprehensive and longer-term projects. Connection Grants support workshops, colloquiums, conferences, forums, summer institutes, or other events or outreach activities that facilitate:

- Disciplinary and/or interdisciplinary exchanges in the social sciences and humanities.
- Scholarly exchanges between those working in the social sciences and humanities and those working in other research fields.
- Intersectoral exchanges between academic researchers in the social sciences and humanities and researchers and practitioners from the public, private and/or not-for-profit sectors.
- International research collaboration and scholarly exchanges with researchers, students and non-academic partners from other countries.

SSHRC welcomes applications involving Indigenous research, as well as those involving research-creation.

#### **Partnership Development Grants**

- Design and test new partnership approaches for research and/or related activities that can result in best practices
  or models—these can either be adapted by others or have the potential to be scaled up to a regional, national or
  international level.

Partnership funding is intended for formal partnerships between postsecondary institutions and/or organizations of various types. The quality of training, mentoring and employability plans for students and emerging scholars will be evaluated as an important part of the proposed initiative.
