

For the second year in a row, the Vanier-based Campus Biodiversity Network (CBN) will be co-hosting the <u>City Nature Challenge</u> in Greater Montreal.

So, whip out your cameras and phones to join in the international challenge from **April 28**th **to May 1**st. That weekend Vanier students, teachers, staff and friends are encouraged to head outside and snap photos of local wildlife using the <u>iNaturalist app</u>. Why? To photograph as many plants and animals as possible and help build a comprehensive database of urban biodiversity and support conservation efforts. The city to record the most observations, both within Canada and across the world, wins the competition.

Last year, Vanier recorded 266 observations over the 4-day challenge. Montreal took home second place out of over 40 participating cities in Canada, with the borough of Saint-Laurent in the lead.

And there's more. Vanier community members will be invited to participate in a series of events on campus in conjunction with the challenge (details to come).

This week, thank you to Jia Ye Wang, a 2nd-year Communications student who has prepared a poster with 5 simple tips to reducing your waste at Vanier, based on our observations at our recent waste audit. Get yourselves set up and try them out!

A large part of our waste comes from food and drinks, so bringing your own lunch, in reusable containers, using a reusable coffee cup or water bottle, or even asking for your meal to be served on a plate in the cafeteria can make a big difference. As a bonus, if you use glass or stainless steel, you'll also be avoiding toxic chemicals found in plastic and even water-resistant paper packaging-better for you and better for the Earth!







Digital Resources for Teaching and Learning

Join Vanier's Digital Competency Community of Practice

I asked Dall-e, an AI image-creator, to generate an image of an Australian quokka in the style of Starry Night, and to the right is what it produced in seconds.

I also asked ChatGPT, an AI text generator made by the creators of Dall-e, to write a sonnet about skiing, an essay about *Jane Eyre*, and a 1,200-word research paper on metaphor theory. It produced each text in seconds. Although by no means perfect, the texts were impressive given the stage of the platform's



development. ChatGPT and similar platforms will no doubt evolve rapidly.

How do we address such technological disruptions? How can we help our students to work with digital technologies appropriately and effectively? The answer is by supporting them in developing their digital competency—the ability to ethically, confidently, critically, and creatively use digital technologies for learning, work, leisure, and social participation. The development of digital competency for all, students and staff, is central to Quebec's Digital Action Plan (DAP).

The challenge of developing our own digital competency while supporting students as they develop theirs is shared across all educational levels: from kindergarten through university. These efforts need to be shared collaboratively. For this reason, Vanier is launching a digital competency community of practice (CoP). The CoP is designed to allow mutual support across disciplines, departments, and sectors of the college.

The CoP will be supported by PSI to ensure that it is maintained across semesters, but it is an initiative that will be teacher- and staff-centered. A community that will evolve over time, it is designed to be a place where we can learn from each other's questions, ideas, challenges, creativity, and solutions. Some colleagues have already created some wonderful projects, classroom-activities and assessments to support digital competency, so the CoP has the potential to be a rich community where silos are broken down and creative initiatives are born.

The CoP will involve virtual and in-person conversations and collaboration. Teachers can participate as much or as little as their time allows. Our hub will be the Microsoft Team DCCoP (Digital Competency Community of Practice). There will be a home page with resources, as well as spaces for conversation, file- and resource-sharing, note-taking,

and more. To join the team, please click the Team icon within Microsoft teams (left menu) and then click "Join or Create a Team. Input the code tq8hp3v.

PSI has also created an Artificial Intelligence page as part of our PSI website. It is currently in its early stages, but you will find access to curated sources on AI in Higher Ed and AI detection: https://www.vaniercollege.gc.ca/psi/ai/

External Grants: Application & Administration Procedures

Want to apply for an external grant?

If you are interested in applying for an external grant, please contact the Research Officer, **Angela Vavassis**, as soon as possible (<u>researchofficer@vaniercollege.qc.ca</u>).

With respect to **developing your grant proposal**, the Research Officer can assist you in:

- Identifying the appropriate funding opportunity, and/or leveraging different funding opportunities for your project(s).
- Evaluating the fit of your project with a funding opportunity that you have identified on your own.
- Acquiring release time costs for teaching and non-teaching personnel from the Finance Department, if applicable.
- Providing information regarding in-kind support that can be provided by the college, if applicable.
- Ensuring that your proposal is in line with the guidelines, regulations and scholarly/scientific standards set by the funding agency and by the college.
- Obtaining all required internal approvals and signatures, in time for the funding agency's deadline.

Should you be awarded an external grant, the Research Officer will guide you with respect to **grant administration.** This includes helping with:

- Opening a grant account with the Finance Department.
- The process of submitting an Application to Conduct Research at Vanier (if applicable Research Projects only), and evaluating your application for institutional feasibility prior to forwarding to the Research Ethics Board (REB).
- The process of preparing and submitting progress, final and financial reports to the funding agencies, and obtaining all required internal signatures for those reports.

What is an Internal Deadline?

The Internal Deadline for each funding opportunity is the date by which the Research Office must receive a **complete application package** (first draft), by email: researchofficer@vaniercollege.qc.ca).

Once the application package has been received, the Research Officer will perform a **preliminary review**. If any edits need to be made to the application, the Research Officer will communicate those to the project leader, and will specify a date by which the application must be re-submitted (final version).

All applications must be submitted in **French**, when indicated. Any applications in need of translation to French must be submitted to the Research Office **at least a week in advance of the internal deadline**.

Please note that the Research Office is unable to guarantee that an application will be processed and submitted to a funding agency on time, if received past the internal deadline.

Applications to Conduct Research at Vanier

Who needs to apply?

Any research project involving human participants must undergo Research Ethics Board (REB) review, if it falls into at least one of the following categories:

- Research that recruits members of the Vanier community as participants.
- Research on human participants conducted by researchers based at Vanier.
- Research that uses data that is accessible within the college but not normally available to the public.

If in doubt, please reach out to <u>researchofficer@vaniercollege.qc.ca</u> and your question will be forwarded to the REB Chair for assessment.

How to apply

The Application to Conduct Research at Vanier (Word form) can be downloaded from our <u>website</u> and, once completed by the project leader, should be sent to <u>researchofficer@vaniercollege.qc.ca</u>, along with all required supporting documents.

When to apply

As soon as possible!

Please take note of the next Winter 2023 application deadline:

- In order to have your application reviewed by the REB at their May 19, 2023 meeting*, please submit it by **May 5, 2023****.

This will be the final application deadline of the 2022-2023 academic year.

^{*} When deciding when to submit your application, please keep in mind that the REB may request modifications to it following the meeting in which they will review it. You may only begin your data collection once your application is approved by the REB and an ethics certificate is issued for your project.

^{**} If you require assistance to complete your application, please reach out at least 1 week earlier than the application deadline.

How are applications evaluated?

All applications to conduct research at Vanier will be evaluated using a 2-step process:

Step 1: Evaluation by the Research Officer, for institutional feasibility

Decisions and/or required changes with respect to institutional feasibility will be communicated to the applicant by the Research Officer. Once the application is deemed institutionally feasible, the Research Officer will forward it to the Research Ethics Board (REB).

Step 2: Evaluation by the Research Ethics Board (REB), for research ethics

Recommendations with regards to the ethical conduct of research and issuance of the Ethics Certificate are provided independently by the Research Ethics Board. Without an Ethics Certificate, you may not begin your data collection.

TCPS 2: CORE-2022 Tutorial (https://tcps2core.ca/)

Within Vanier's Strategic Plan 2021-2026, an emphasis is placed on creativity and innovation, both within academic areas and without. In many cases, such innovation results from research projects involving human participants, which are conducted by our faculty and staff.

The college is also committed to upholding the highest standards of practice and integrity in its operations.

As such, we highly encourage members of the Vanier community who are currently conducting or who plan to conduct research with humans to complete the **TCPS 2: CORE-2022 Tutorial**, at their earliest convenience. This tutorial introduces the Tri-Council Policy Statement: Ethical Conduct for Research Involving Humans (TCPS 2). Upon completion of the tutorial, you will receive a Certificate.

Many institutions that have research divisions have already made the completion of this training a standard of practice for their researchers, research ethics boards and research administrators. Following their lead will help us ensure that all research with humans overseen by the college is conducted in an ethically sound manner.

Please note that this training is not a requirement yet. However, **beginning in Fall 2022, all researchers who wish to conduct research involving humans at Vanier College will be required to complete the TCPS 2: CORE-2022 Tutorial**. The certificate they obtain must be included as an attachment with every Application to Conduct Research (involving humans) at Vanier.

External Funding Opportunities

Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC)

Connection Grants

These grants support events and outreach activities geared toward short-term, targeted knowledge mobilization initiatives. These events and activities represent opportunities to exchange knowledge and to engage with participants on research issues of value to them. Events and outreach activities funded by a Connection Grant can often serve as a first step toward more comprehensive and longer-term projects. Connection Grants support workshops, colloquiums, conferences, forums, summer institutes, or other events or outreach activities that facilitate:

- Disciplinary and/or interdisciplinary exchanges in the social sciences and humanities.
- Scholarly exchanges between those working in the social sciences and humanities and those working in other research fields.
- Intersectoral exchanges between academic researchers in the social sciences and humanities and researchers and practitioners from the public, private and/or not-for-profit sectors.
- International research collaboration and scholarly exchanges with researchers, students and non-academic partners from other countries.

SSHRC welcomes applications involving Indigenous research, as well as those involving research-creation.

Funding provided: \$7,000-\$25,000 (1 year) for events; \$7,000 to \$50,000 (1 year) for outreach activities

Partnership Engage Grants

These grants provide short-term and timely support for partnered research activities that will inform decision-making at a single partner organization from the public, private or not-for-profit sector. The small-scale, stakeholder-driven partnerships supported through Partnership Engage Grants are meant to respond to immediate needs and time constraints facing organizations in non-academic sectors. In addressing an organization-specific need, challenge and/or opportunity, these partnerships let non-academic organizations and postsecondary researchers access each other's unique knowledge, expertise and capabilities on topics of mutual interest.

Funding provided: \$7,000-\$25,000 (1 year)

Internal Deadline: June 1st, 2023 External Deadline: June 15th, 2023 Results announced: August 2023

Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC)

Applied Research and Development (ARD) Grants

ARD grants are institutional grants. This means that the institution, rather than an individual, is identified as the grant recipient. The applicant may be a senior administrator at the college or a researcher, who prepares the application and is responsible for administering the grant on behalf of the institution.

ARD grants support a wide range of research and development (R&D) projects undertaken by college researchers with partner organizations in the private, public and not-for-profit sectors. Other academic institutions may be included as co-applicants. A project must seek to respond to an applied research challenge, but cannot be used to support secret or contract research.

ARD grants fund direct costs of research as well as some indirect costs up to a total of \$150,000 per year for up to 3 years, not including the contribution from partner organization(s).

To apply for an ARD grant, the college must include at least one partner organization that is recognized for cost sharing. The <u>ARD grants estimator tool</u> calculates the maximum grant amount that may be requested from NSERC based on the partner contribution amount or the minimum contribution amount needed for a specified grant size.

Internal Deadline: For this funding opportunity, please account for a minimum 4-week delay between the time the Research Officer receives your complete application and the time of submission to NSERC.

External Deadline: Applications can be submitted at any time.
